Keep These

1. Strategy begins by defining the real objective.
2. Terrain, timing, incentives, and information shape every move.
3. A victory can still be foolish if it costs too much afterward.
4. Changing conditions can make confrontation smaller or unnecessary.
5. Restraint is not weakness when it preserves strength for what matters.

Useful Translation

This is the version to carry into meetings, parenting, work, money, politics, conflict, and the ordinary Tuesday where most theories go to prove whether they are useful.

FRAMEWORK 01

Strategic terrain: context and conditions determine what action means.

FRAMEWORK 02

Economy of force: spend resources according to importance, not irritation.

FRAMEWORK 03

Indirect route: alter incentives, timing, defaults, and information before escalating.

04 / ACTION ITEMS

1. Define the actual win in one sentence.
2. Map the terrain: timing, incentives, relationships, information, constraints.
3. Count the cost of being right in public.
4. Change one condition before pushing harder.
5. Decline one provocation whose prize is only ego relief.
6. Choose the quiet move that makes the dramatic move unnecessary.
